
SCRAPIFIED Sawtooth Star



◆ PATTERN NOTES ❖◆

The Scrapified Sawtooth Star Block was inspired by wanting to find a way to use up small and oddly shaped scrap fabric pieces. How to make "scrapified" fabric from your scrap fabric stash can be found as a tutorial on the Alderwood Studio Blog.



◆ Three different sizes of Scrapified Sawtooth Star Blocks are included in this pattern. Choose which size you'd like to make and follow the Block Assembly Instructions using the measurements for your chosen size.

A - F	Scrap fabrics in 6 different colorways					
Background	1 fat eighth	1 fat eighth	1 fat quarter			


	Cutting Instructions			
Fabric	8" block	12" block	18" block	
A - F scrapified fabric	(6) 3¼" sq	(6) 4¼" sq	(6) 5¾" sq	
Background	(6) 3¼" sq (BG1) (4) 2½" sq (BG2)	(6) 4¼" sq (BG1) (4) 3½" sq (BG2)	(6) 5¾" sq (BG1) (4) 5" sq (BG2)	

◆ BLOCK ASSEMBLY ❖◆

1. Mark a diagonal line on the wrong side of (1) BG1 square. Then place the BG1 square with right sides together on top of (1) scrapified Fabric A square.




2. Sew ¼" away on each side of the drawn line, then cut *ON* the drawn line. Press seams open or toward the background fabric to create (2) scrapified Fabric A Half Square Triangles (abbreviated as "A"). Trim to the size listed in the table below.



Fabric	8" block	12" block	18" block
A - F	2½" x 2½"	3½" x 3½"	5" x 5"

3. Repeat Steps 1 and 2 for the remaining scrapified fabric B, C, D, E, and F squares.



4. Arrange the (4) BG2 squares and the A-F HSTs as shown below. First, sew the pieces into rows, pressing seams open or in the same direction (alternate directions for each row). Then sew the rows together and press seams open. A tailor's clapper can be used to help bulky seams become more flat.
